What happens at a roadside drug test?

Saliva samples are used to detect illicit drugs.

An absorbent swab, like a large cotton bud, collects saliva from the tongue and inside the cheek of the person being tested.

THE TEST DETECTS:

methamphetamine (ice, speed)













What will you be asked to do?

- 1 Drivers are asked to provide a saliva sample.
- 2 The sample is analysed at the roadside, this takes about 3 minutes.
- 3 If a driver has a positive result, they are asked to undertake a further test.
- 4 If this test is also positive, the sample is sent to a laboratory for confirmation.
- 5 The results of this lab test form the basis for charging the driver.



Cannabis can be detected for around 12 hours after use (if used occasionally) and up to 30 hours for daily use.



Methamphetamine and MDMA can be detected for around 48 hours after use.



Don't forget

- If you're taking medication, talk to your doctor about whether it is safe to drive.
- It's safest not to drive after you have used alcohol or other drugs.
- Even if you feel okay to drive you can still be affected and be a danger to yourself and others.
